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

Message from the PRESIDENT & EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

This year's theme **Together We're Better** reminds us that Community Living Associations are much more than service delivery agents for the funding Ministries. We are an integral part of a concerned community of people with intellectual disabilities and their families and the many local organizations, businesses and groups that make up a rich and diversified community. While our role as a transfer payment agency funded by and accountable to the funding Ministries is very important—in that it enables us to provide quality supports to many people with disabilities and families—we also have a responsibility to our greater community and, in particular, the many families not receiving supports and services from Community Living Belleville and Area. Together with the many people with disabilities, families, groups of families, business partners, volunteers, staff and also those in our community who may be feeling isolated and unable to access needed supports and services, if we work sincerely to engage with and assist people in our community, **Together We're Better!**

We are pleased to report on another successful year at

Community Living Belleville and Area. 2013/14 has been, despite no funding increases, another year of growth and progress. While we have grown in size, more significantly our growth and progress have been most noticeable in our further outreach into our community, forging new connections, building on our community partnerships, striving to engage with and assist people with disabilities and their families who have not been able to access supports and services, all the while continuing our quality enhancement efforts.

You will recall that last year we reported that the Ministry of Community and Social Services provided us with fiscal innovation funding to support modernization of adult developmental services. This funding enabled local developmental services agencies and families in this area to work together and learn about innovative residential options. As we hoped would happen, the Family Action Committee continued to meet and subsequently, with the support of Community Living Belleville and Area, applied for and received additional innovation funding to take a more substantial, action-oriented step toward addressing

important gaps. The aim of this project is to provide families and their adult sons and daughters with increasing transitional respite and the opportunity for their adult sons and daughters to build upon the skills they will need in order to successfully transition from their family home to a home of their own.

Community Living Belleville and Area was also successful in receiving Developmental Services Inclusion and Employment Opportunities Partnership funding to hire a facilitator to develop and implement a job readiness program. Quinte Vocational Support Services, as a partner, and META Employment Services, Loyalist College and Community Visions and Networking as supporting organizations, continue to be resources to this important project which will benefit more than sixty people as they receive job development and readiness training. This will put them in a more competitive position when it comes to applying for jobs.

We are very proud that Community Living Belleville and Area continues to be a progressive agency always examining ways and means to improve in the way we support

people to live a good and inclusive life in the community. Our efforts at quality improvement must never stop.

“Engaging Families to Consider Innovative Residential Supports in Hastings and Prince Edward Counties” was a two-month project funded by the Ministry of Community and Social Services Service Delivery Modernization – Fiscal Innovation Fund. With this funding, we were able to hire a Co-Ordinator from February 18 to April 12, 2013. The Co-Ordinator met with many local families on waitlists for residential and community participation supports to:

- Look at best practices in innovative residential options and community participation supports;

- Discuss their future and what will be required to plan for unique and innovative supports for their sons/daughters when and as required;

- Organize a Family Forum – in collaboration with Counselling Services of Belleville and District and Community Living North Hastings Community Integration

Society – that would bring together families in the Hastings and Prince Edward Counties to learn about unique and innovative residential supports in other parts of Ontario; and

- Establish interest groups to further the ideas generated through this forum.

It was further recommended that Family Action Groups be created and sustained, to focus on such topics as housing, circles of support, meaningful days, beyond school transitions, etc. with agency



supported facilitators to assist these groups.

Through a grant from the Harry E. Foster Foundation, Community Living Belleville and Area – in collaboration with Community Living Prince Edward – assisted families to plan for and host a “Beyond Graduation Family Workshop”, an experiential training and connecting day. With a critical shortage of day support options for young people with disabilities leaving high school or who have recently graduated and whose families are struggling with post-

high school support challenges, this workshop aimed to make this transition less frightening for these young people and their families by providing a forum for information sharing, goal setting and action planning for a good life beyond school.

Early in 2014, we received additional funding through the Ministry of Community and Social Services Service Delivery Modernization – Fiscal Innovation Fund which enabled us to develop a 14-month project entitled “Transition to a Home of Our Own.” The aim of this project is to provide people with developmental disabilities and their families with increasing transitional respite. During this transitional respite period, people with developmental disabilities will learn and build upon the skills they will need in order to successfully transition from their family home to supported independent living. By the end of the 14-month project, we will have identified four to six

people who could successfully live independently with support.

We became a funded agency of the United Way of Quinte. With the addition of funding from the United Way of Quinte, and in collaboration with Highland Shores Children’s Aid, we have been able to continue to support the increasing number of families in our Families First program, respond effectively to those families who are in severe crisis and remove the most vulnerable families and children from the waitlist to a more stable and healthy state.

Through a grant from The Rotary Club of Belleville, we were able to join the Partners for Planning Resource Network, a dynamic online resource for families caring for a child or adult with a disability. Families can access this free resource network through our website at www.communitylivingbelleville.org. The Partners for Planning Resource Network provides families with helpful tools, information and

expertise on a variety of topics relevant to creating a good life and a safe, secure future for their relative with a disability.

Community Living Belleville and Area has expanded supports and services within our Associate Family Program. With this expansion, we prepared to hire an Assistant, Associate Family Homes, on a one-year contract. Part of this role will include providing assistance and support for the Innovation Project and family engagement, which includes working with the Family Action Committee.

We had great success with two friendship groups run through the Families First program, both in the fall and winter. We had a total of 11 youth who attended the groups which were run by our placement students and a staff. New friendships were built that have carried over beyond the friendship group, families have connected to offer support to each other and the youth learned some great skills while having fun!

We are a partner agency with the Triple P Parenting Program in Hastings and Prince Edward Counties. Community Living Belleville and Area has two trainers on staff, one of whom facilitates group sessions with families and the other provides individual counselling and works directly one-on-one with families.







▶ The Ministry of Community and Social Services, through its Inclusion and Employment Opportunities Partnership Fund, provided a grant that allowed us to hire a Job Readiness Facilitator. This project was established in partnership with Quinte Vocational Support Services, Meta Employment Services, Loyalist College and Community Visions and Networking. The responsibilities of the Job Readiness Facilitator will be to provide job development and pre-employment skills training.

▶ Thanks to one-time funding from the Ministry of Community and Social Services, we were able to purchase a new accessibility van. In addition, this one-time funding enabled us to equip all of our 19

locations with electrical standby generators which power on automatically in the event of a hydro outage. Several locations received new furnaces, air conditioners, hot water heaters and HEPA filters. Three new roofs were installed, along with several lifts. Computers were upgraded at most locations.

▶ Ontario MPPs Laura Albanese and Christine Elliott co-chaired the Select Committee on Developmental Services, a special committee of the Legislative Assembly on Ontario. The Select Committee exists to “consider the urgent need for a comprehensive developmental services strategy to address the needs of children, youth and adults in Ontario with an intellectual disability or who are dually diagnosed with an intellectual disability and a mental illness, and to coordinate the delivery of developmental programs and services across many provincial ministries in addition to the Ministry of

Community and Social Services.” On December 18, 2013, our Executive Director John Klassen (Chair of the Provincial Executive Directors Group) and Alan McWhorter (Advisor to the PEDG) made a presentation to the Select Committee at Queen’s Park in Toronto, on behalf of the Provincial Executive Directors Group of Community Living Ontario. In March 2014, the Select Committee released its Interim Report.

◆ #1 on the Ontario Ombudsman’s top 10 stories of 2013: “Adults with developmental disabilities in crisis: 1,000+ complaints and counting.”

◆ Ontario Premier Kathleen Wynne delivered an apology for the abuse which occurred in provincial institutions.

◆ In its Federal Budget 2014, the Government of Canada announced that it will provide \$222 million annually, matched by the provinces and territories, over the next four years, through a new generation of Labour Market Agreements for Persons with Disabilities. The new agreements will engage employers and disability community organizations to better meet the needs of persons


with disabilities and employers. Two complementary initiatives supported through EAP 2014 are an investment of \$15 million over three years to connect persons with developmental disabilities with jobs through the Ready, Willing & Able initiative of the Canadian Association for Community Living, and an investment of \$11.4 million over four years to support the expansion of vocational training

programs for persons with Autism Spectrum Disorder.

◆ We were very saddened to learn of the sudden death of Jim Flaherty. Mr. Flaherty was Canada’s Finance Minister and a remarkable Canadian with a passion for making a difference in the lives of people with disabilities.



Ministry of Community and Social Services Minister Ted McMeekin announced the Government of Ontario will invest \$810 million in the developmental services sector in Ontario over the next three years, the largest ever funding increase to Ontario’s DS sector.



Community Living Belleville and Area celebrates our long service employees. Ninety-eight of our current employees have been with us more than 15 years with ten of those employees celebrating over 30 years – Wow! We also welcomed twenty-one new hires during the 2013-14 year!



Congratulations to Vickie Brandt and Josh Baerwinkel on their completion of the Autism Spectrum Disorder Certificate Training Program, Level 1. This twelve-module course provided participants with a comprehensive knowledge of Autism Spectrum Disorder and evidence-based Positive Behavioural Supports knowledge.



As part of our engagement in the Ontario Developmental Service Human Resources Strategy, the Management Team was trained in Core Competencies in February. Training sessions will be held with the staff in the fall of 2014. This integrated and multi-faceted approach will help position employment in our sector as a “career of choice” in Ontario and increase the sense of professionalism experienced by our current and future employees.




